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First Aid & Sickness Policy

It is our policy to ensure that appropriate First Aid arrangements are in place for our staff, pupils and any visitors to our premises. This includes providing sufficiently trained employees and maintaining an adequate supply of first aid equipment. This policy has been written using guidance from the DFES Good Practice Guide (updated February 2014) – Guidance on First Aid in Schools. This policy should also be read in conjunction with the school Health and Safety Policy, Medicine and Asthma Policies.

First Aid Training

We have a number of staff who attend First Aid training in accordance with current legal requirements which allows them to administer emergency first aid to children and adults. The school maintains an up-to-date list of those employees who have undergone first aid training. All staff will be informed of First Aid arrangements and made aware of this policy as part of their induction.

First Aid Equipment

All classrooms have a fixed locked wall mounted 'First Aid' cabinet. First Aid kits are also kept in the school office, hall kitchen and staff kitchen. A list of children with known medical conditions is kept in the School Office and the classroom. A list of adults with known medical conditions is kept in the School Office. Each classroom has 'Guidance for Minor Injuries' in their First Aid cabinet. Each classroom has a First Aid/Health Checklist. In addition to this, portable first aid kits are provided for out of school visits. The checking and ordering of stock is carried out by the admin staff and support staff, who fill the boxes around school, dispose of any out of date items and ensure that enough stock is maintained to supply the school.

Accident Procedures

During playtimes and lunchtimes injuries that require first aid treatment should be dealt with in the first instance by the staff on duty. For injuries that require closer attention or are of a serious nature, the Appointed Person should be immediately notified. Minor incidents and accidents should be dealt with, wounds cleaned etc and the child returned to the playground when possible and practical. Persons administering First Aid should wear disposable gloves where bodily fluids are involved. An adult witness should be present if tending an intimate part of the body. Any dressings or materials which have been in contact with body fluids (e.g. blood, vomit etc) must be disposed of by 'double wrapping' in a plastic bag or being disposed of using the 'sanitary bins' in the toilets which are emptied by an appointed contractor. During lesson times if no trained member of staff is present, and the injury cannot be dealt with, the child should be sent to the office, accompanied by another child or adult. **No child should be left alone if they are ill.**

All head bumps/injuries must be recorded (including a brief description of the incident) in the 'bump book' and the child receive a sticker to say that they have 'received first aid at school'. Parents should also be notified at the end of the day by the class teachers of any significant concerns if they have not already been contacted.

If a child has an accident, which requires urgent hospital treatment, the school will be responsible for calling an ambulance in order for the child to receive urgent medical treatment. When an ambulance has been arranged, parents will then be informed and arrangements can be made where they should meet their child. If parents cannot be contacted a member of staff will accompany the child and stay with them until the parents arrive. In the case of non-urgent hospital treatment, parents will be informed immediately and arrangements made for the parents to collect their child.

Illness

The decision to send an unwell child home will be made by a member of the Senior Leadership Team.

Vomiting and diarrhoea

There are buckets in every classroom for pupils who feel sick. 'Sanitaire emergency clean-up', mops and buckets may all be found in the caretaker's cupboard.

- Sprinkle with 'Sanitaire'
- Remove debris
- Hoover if area is carpet
- Mop with disinfectant if hard floor area – use Red Mop and Bucket

Vomit must be treated as a biohazard and the area must be thoroughly disinfected. If a child vomits or has diarrhoea in school, they will be sent home immediately.

Children or adults that have been absent from school with vomiting or diarrhoea will not be accepted back into school until 48 hours after the last symptom has elapsed.

Head lice

If we suspect a child has head lice we will inform parents and ask them to examine them. We will also send a note home to all children in the class asking parents to examine them.

Pastoral Care

There may be occasions that children state that they are unwell or require First Aid but actually require 'pastoral care'. Incidents requiring 'Pastoral Care' should be treated as follows:

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- If an incident occurs during a teaching session, a member of staff supporting the class / year group should take 'Pastoral' care of the child ensuring his/her well-being.
- If an incident occurs at playtime the teacher on duty should take 'Pastoral' care of the child ensuring his/her well-being. It is the teacher's responsibility to inform the child's class teacher.
- If an incident occurs at lunchtime the Senior Lunchtime Supervisor should take 'Pastoral' care of the child ensuring his/her well-being. If they require additional support they will seek the support of a member of the Senior Leadership Team.
